The context in Wales

- Steady rise in the number of children looked after: in England 80,850 and over 6,000 in Wales for year ending 31 March 2021
- Government's austerity policies resulted in shortfall in children's social care funding
- Difficulties in recruiting and retaining social workers, use of agency staff
- Pressure on local authorities to identify and assess carers – exacerbated by Covid19

Case reviews

- 52 published reviews over 12 year period 2007-2019
- England = 45, Wales = 6, Scotland = 1
- Reviews provided rich insights and emerging themes were clearly identifiable
- Reviews were very different in size and format, and used different methods of reviewing
- Reviews varied in information on: the local authority, child's sex, age, ethnicity, or disability

Who were the carers at the time of the incident (n=52)

- 39 (75%) cases involved foster carers
- 7 (13%) cases involved adopters
- 6 (12%) cases involved special guardians

What happened to the children (52 cases – 98 children)

- Children who died = 19
- Children who were seriously harmed = 79
 Sexually abused = 49 (62%) half involved a serial

abuser

≻Neglect = 4 (5%)

Other = 3 (4%) children who had killed or abused another

Child characteristics (n=98)

- 19 children died:
- Age was a factor in child fatalities, but not their sex
 Young children tended to die from fatal physical abuse or severe neglect
 - Teenagers tended to kill themselves
- 79 children seriously harmed:
- Majority of children seriously harmed had been sexually abused, of these:

➤ 70.5% were less than 10 years old

➢ 62% were girls

• Children with disabilities over-represented in the sample and higher proportion died

Concerns over quality of carer assessments

- Reviews identified concerns about the assessment of carers in 23 of the 52 cases
- 14 (36%) cases involved foster carers
- 3 (43%) cases involved adopters
- 6 (100%) cases involved special guardians
 All the special guardianship reviews had been

All the special guardianship reviews had been published between 2016 and 2019

Avoiding the pitfalls identified in the assessment and selection of carers (1)

- Rigorous scrutiny, verification and analysis of information from all relevant sources
- Fully explore applicants' previous history
- Discover all critical information
- Follow up references and do not take them at face value
- Explore applicants' motivation to care for a child
- Keep a safeguarding focus during assessment

Avoiding the pitfalls identified in assessment and selection of carers (2)

- Follow up any professional unease
- Do not allow anxiety about discrimination to inhibit probing and affect judgements
- Be objective with long standing carers
- Adequate scrutiny by fostering & adoption panels and decision-makers is essential
- Thorough assessment when child changes status or transfers to a different provider or moves to another area
- Detailed and comprehensive assessments for special guardianship

Matching child and family: key issues

- SWs and carers need to understand long-term impact of abuse and neglect, and effects of placement changes on a child
- Adequate preparation and training for carers
- Adequate preparation and support for the child
- Explore possible impact on all children in the household
- Identify necessary skills, qualities and experience of carers and their support needs

Challenges to understanding a child's experience of living with carers (1)

- Local authorities have a duty to support and review child's safety and wellbeing; however difficulties can arise as a result of:
 - Carousel of social workers, high turnover of staff and lack of time and resources
 - ➢ Referrals seen in isolation
 - > Not listening to or hearing child's views and wishes
 - Children with disabilities need additional help to get their views heard
 - Other available support rarely secured, e.g. independent visitors or mentors

Challenges to understanding a child's experience of living with carers (2)

- Carers erect barriers to knowing a child
 - Home schooling
 - Absence from school
 - Missed appointments
- Carers influence professional judgments
 Creating a positive impression
 Avoiding oversight
 - Dividing professional opinion
- Professionals assume children are safe when placed – essential to maintain professional uncertainty

Carers controlling the child's narrative

- Preventing professionals from seeing children in private
- Blaming the child for signs of abuse and neglect
- Fabricating or inducing illness in the child
- Influencing children through:
 - ➢ Bribes
 - ≻Fear
 - Undermining trust in professionals

Everybody's responsibility

- These children's lives were particularly complex; many different professionals were involved
- Other barriers to a shared response:
 No lead professional or co-ordinator
 Uncertainty of how to escalate concerns
 Lack of formal processes
 Focus on own professional specialism
 Changes of local authority

Key messages from the study (1)

- Every child placed away from home needs to feel wanted and loved, and safe and secure
- Keep each child in mind and at the heart of all decisions, including the choice of their placement
- In supporting and reviewing each child, ensure their views and wishes are heard and acted upon
- Build strong networks of well inter-connected professionals around each child and their carers

Key messages from the study (2)

- Assessments need to be rigorous, have a safeguarding focus and explore sensitive issues
- Children often come from complex backgrounds: carers will need considerable support
- Professional unease and uncertainty about carers should always be addressed
- Improve leadership, supervision and support for professionals through local authority investment
